music and, as can be seen, there was a high uptake of theme tunes (highlighted).



## THE MIDLAND ACCORDION FESTIVAL

Arriving at the Mercure Hotel, West Bromwich, around 2 pm on Friday 12th November, I was feeling slightly apprehensive, meeting friends I had not seen since before lockdown. The hotel staff was helpful and welcoming and I had soon unpacked and gone down to where accordionists from all over the country were gathering. After two years with no festivals or band meetings we were like excited kids, everywhere people getting together in groups and exchanging news.

Barry Smith, the organiser, had arranged for complementary coffee during the afternoon and old friendships were re-kindled. The atmosphere was wonderful and after a very nice dinner we were in our seats ready for the first concert. We had concerts each afternoon and evening which were brilliant, and the standard of playing was extremely high. 'Play your Party Piece' was a very popular section and players

who would normally only play in groups ventured out as soloists. Then in the evening after dinner (all meals were excellent), the professionals (*pictured above*) took over. The standard of playing was amazing – after each 'spot' it seemed it could not keep up the standard, but it always did.

In the mornings there were workshops run by volunteer conductors – Jean Hanger led the Vintage Band and Elementary Orchestra, Angie Lukins led the Scottish, and Nigel Pasby led the Intermediate Orchestra.



Each conductor led with patience and good humour, and the players loved it and worked hard towards showing off in the final afternoon concert.

An interesting hour was provided by our own Steve Hughes and Tony Britton, explaining how the MuseScore programme works.

The first two days followed a pattern but on the Sunday there was a beautiful tribute for Remembrance Sunday. Stan Shakespeare and Harry Hussey (92 years old and having driven from Glasgow) were there, both wearing their medals. David

Vernon in his kilt played the bagpipes, Stan read the words we have all come to know, and a 2 minute silence followed. It was very moving for the audience (*see above left*).

The last night concert was introduced by the Black Country Accordion Band – they gave us some rousing music and played for a good half hour. This was followed by all the guests doing a final spot and then the 'goodbye' speeches. One thing for certain, Barry Smith and his team must have spent months working on the running of the show. Nothing was left to chance, it was faultless and 'Now is the Hour' played by the pros and sung by the ecstatic audience was the lasting memory.

Barry informed us that he hopes to run the festival again next year and I for one will be looking forward to it.
