

# MULL MUSIC FESTIVAL - MY HAPPY PLACE!

I first went to Mull Music Festival in 2012. My husband, Jason, has been going since 2001 (way before we met!) with a bunch of dare-devil deep sea divers who thought it was great fun to live on a boat for a week, go diving, drink too much beer and whisky, dance all night till 3am, sleep for a couple or three hours, then go diving again. Unfortunately, the annual dive trip tailed off due to costs – which was great for me because I was invited to go!

The drive from Stone to Oban is a long one – and that first year in 2012 we were travelling in style in an aging Fiat Scudo van – with an airbed

in the back and a camping stove. We set off in good spirits early evening, up the M6 and into Scotland, carried on up the motorway to Glasgow – then across the Erskine Bridge, and then the drive got really pretty, as we drove along Loch Lomond in the dead of night with a full moon and a clear sky – where we encountered many red deer in the road. We arrived in Oban at 3am and parked up on a hill where we slept a bit!



I woke up in the morning in a heap by the back door of the van, which was being driven down the hill to the ferry port – which was literally yards away! We caught the 7am ferry and had a hearty Scottish

breakfast on the boat with some weird square meat they called a sausage and some triangle things they called scones – they were nice though. The crossing to Craignure on the Isle of Mull was beautiful, and only took about 45 minutes, so we were soon getting ready to disembark.

Once on the Island, we were both really excited to get to Tobermory,



Jason couldn't wait for me to see it! It is about a 20-mile drive – along a road that is very twisty and single track




in parts – but wow, what stunning scenery! We dropped down into Tobermory a little while later and pulled onto the harbour car park – which was to be our campsite for the weekend. I was amazed to see camper vans, caravans, and even tents already there. It's not a big car park, but somehow, we managed to bag a fabulous space – where when we opened the back door of our salubrious home, we had the most fantastic view across the bay

and the town. I fell in love with the place right there and then.

The music – so each year the music festival (and there are loads of these all over Scotland – it is well worth going to one) starts gently on the Thursday evening, and then there is music playing from 12 noon

to 3am in the 5 pubs/hotels in the town throughout Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Each pub or hotel may have more than one room – so the variety of music is amazing – from your very traditional Gaelic folk tunes – fiddle players, ukulele players, accordionists, keyboard players, guitarists, vocalists – to some very good cover bands – with music of all types. And each group / band is excellent. During the daytime, many of the band members, who might also be camping on the car park, just set up and play tunes on the car park – no agenda – they just play because they love it.

Since that first visit in 2012 - I was hooked, and we go every year – we have even upgraded the accommodation to a caravan – which is so much nicer!



Mishnish. They were thrilled as nobody had ever got married there before, and they made it really pretty for us – we had one of the festival bands called the Mad Ferrets playing for us, we had the registrar come



down to the hotel and do the deed at 11am – we had a few close friends and family there – and loads of festival goers – most of whom we know – watching us make our vows – then after the ceremony and some food – we carried on with the festival. It was so special, and exactly what we wanted. We even made the Oban News!

BUT let's talk about accordions – this is an accordion club after all!

We have seen many fantastic accordionists at the music festival over the years. Some traditional – and some 'extreme' One year we saw a young lad, Ruairidh MacLean, he was about 16 at the time, playing AC/DC's Thunderstruck on his accordion. It was the most amazing thing I had ever heard and seen. I was Thunderstruck! He is pretty famous now – and goes by the name RuMac – he has loads of stuff on YouTube – look him up he is

### fabulous!

In 2017 I first saw an artist who goes by the name Jock the Box (*above left*), his name is John McMillan and he plays a set with his band partner Dunky – they play at the top of the hill in the Park Lodge hotel – it is a VERY steep walk up there – but it was Jock who inspired me to want to learn to play. I watched him and Dunky with my mouth open! Dunky plays every instrument going – he is an incredible musician, and Jock just plays his box – but the sounds he can make with the electronic midi unit he has is

incredible. There is not so much of his music on YouTube, you will find a bit – but he played on stage with the Stranglers a few years back – so you will be able to find him playing Golden Brown.

It was after COVID when we went back to Tobermory, in 2022 that we saw Jock and Dunky again – and I said to Jason – I NEED to get one of those things – I am sure I could play something. When we got home – about a fortnight later – a very large parcel was delivered. I left it by the front door thinking that it was a car part or something that Jason had ordered. Anyway, when he got home – he gave it to me and said – it's for you, open it. I had NO IDEA what it might be – even when I got the case out. I would know now what an accordion case looked like – but back then I had no idea, until I undid the clasps and opened it up! It was a small 32 Bass Worldmaster that he had bought off Jock for me. I was hooked.

When we went back to Mull this year in April, I took my 120 Bass Paulo Soprani 'Box' with me – and I played music on the car park by myself – and joined in with a few of the others 'jamming'. I took it to the Mishnish on the Sunday night – where all of the bands come together in a big jamming session on the stage. I was invited up to join them.

I RAN A MILE! Maybe next year!!!!
