KNUTSFORD ACCORDION DAY

It's not long to go now for the **Knutsford Accordion Day**, our gathering of North West accordionists (and anyone else who wishes to join in) on Saturday the 18th May. It takes place in the stunning **Hall at Marthall**. The hall was built in 2009 funded with the aid of a lottery grant and sports under floor heating and a living roof. After our successful event last year under the direction of Anita Bašić, our MD this year is **Andrew Purkiss**. Proceeds from the event will be donated to the Cancer Research UK charity.

Andrew is a retired head of music and has 23 years' experience in music education. He managed large music departments in secondary schools and produced regularly scheduled

celebration concerts and musicals and has been commissioned to write schemes of work for local music services.

Andrew started playing the accordion at 8 years old under the tutorage of Mr Colin Whitfield.



He went on to gain the LBCA Performer diploma as well as grade 8 ABRSM Distinction in both clarinet and voice. His progression to a professional accordionist was further developed through tuition from Graham Romani and John Leslie who managed his conversion to B system button accordion and free bass. He competed annually at NAO national finals.

His career as a professional musician has included theatre work as both a musician and director for European tours with the Scala Theatre Company and the West End. Andrew still performs

regularly in folk ensembles and really enjoys the genre of traditional music because of its use of the aural tradition and improvisation.

Andrew has delivered workshops and courses at both residential music centres and folk festivals around the country. Specifically, he has experience in ensembles performing with the Southampton Youth Orchestra, Rufus Return and Solent Accordions as both player and director.

Andrew's teaching is focussed on musicianship, instrument control and a robust pedagogy that centres on the needs of individuals, ensemble playing and performance skills.

FEBRUARY CLUB NIGHT

Norman is now 86 years

'Imagine, as a very small child, being whisked away from the North West of England to the Northern reaches of Nigeria, West Africa, to a completely different culture, language, food... and weather! Imagine also travelling around the borders of Nigeria on a railway coach built



for a family of five that travelled as far North to the beginnings of the Sahara desert. This is what happened to me!

But it wasn't just that, there were the sights, the sounds, smells and colours of deepest Africa. From the hypnotic African drummers and colourfully clothed dancers, the 'JuJu' men, and where the local children, who had never seen white man before, who simply came out of the bush to play with me.

They had nothing! Nothing materialistically, but were happy! I remember the handsome black faces and perfectly white teeth, and

I am sure they remember my blonde hair and blue eyes. They would pick up and stroke my blonde hair with open mouths, as if the colour was a figment of their imagination. This is where my creativeness, my imagination, had a kickstart.

Then came the brutality of the Biafran war, the tribal massacre of men, women and children and we escaped back to England to lick our wounds. Boarding school and art figured in my life, and much later on I became a successful actor and sportsman, then subsequently an author, but only after being told by a clairvoyant that I must write! And I did, and 27 successful books later, some best sellers, mainly children's and fantasy, wrote my greatest work, the trilogy, The Wand Chronicles, which is shortly to be made into a major TV series. www.thewand.me





And then, many years after my 'A'

level art, I picked up a paintbrush, some cheap acrylic paints and started to paint...and haven't stopped! Now having numerous commissions and sales of my paintings under my belt, although I will explore all sorts of styles, I am drawn back again, and again, to paintings that are sometimes abstract and heavily influenced by the deep, rich, colours of Africa.'
