

# 40<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

welcome Newcastle's Mayor and Mayoress, Councillor Robert and Mrs Judy Bettley-Smith. Other guests were, founder member of our club, Joy Rendell, who travelled up by train from Paignton, Devon, her friend Yvonne Porter, Rob and Marj Howard from the Stockport, and Barry and Christine Smith from the Black Country accordion clubs.

To open the evening the club band, under the direction of Steve Houghton (who was then to compere the rest of the evening), performed a selection of their repertoire including a great version of *Casey Jones*, featuring some wonderful train like bellows shakes, and finally The Anniversary Waltz.

Afterwards we went swiftly on to the delicious homemade pie, pea and gravy supper which was rapidly



served and enjoyed by all.

Speech time - Mike Richards, the only current club member who was also a founding member, was first to speak, and reminisced about the beginnings of the club and the first year, when the ground rules were laid

down and the newsletter was first introduced; a time when membership was £1 per annum! He told us how he and the late George Karklins were instrumental in getting it going, together with Brian Shufflebotham and Aubrey Lowndes (both also deceased) after visits to Club Accord in Birmingham. Joy Rendell (then



Kibble) joined the newly formed committee. It was a time when the late Malcom Gee had great influence on the accordion scene and many of the clubs formed in that period followed his template.

The Mayor then said a few words, thanking us for the invitation which he had gladly accepted as the accordion is a favourite instrument of his. He spoke about the encouragement given by the council to organisations

offering music to the youth of the borough.

He was followed by Joy who talked about her experiences while a member, and her musical life including having been instrumental in the formation of Club Accord of Birmingham, and Sheffield Accordion Club (as was).

It was then time for the cutting of the cake. This had been created by Barbara Cole and yours truly. Barbara baked two delicious cakes (wellfed with whisky) and I cut and pasted them together and iced them to (hopefully) fashion them into an accordion. Joy and Mike did the cake-

cutting honours and it was briskly delivered to the tables.

The evening was rounded off with music. Mike Richards and Paul Hobbs played duets - *Island Waltz* (*Weltering Home; Skye; Rothesay Bay*), *Cotton Eyed Joe, Genevieve Waltz & Marino Waltz* – (Medley)



Next was Joy, who played *La Vie en Rose*, *C'est Tout/Amor / Perfidia* - medley, and *Reginella Campagnola* (the woodpecker song).

After this was John Baranek who played a most wonderful sounding button accordion giving us *Siboney* by E. Lecuona, *Valse de Paris* by J.P.Cernay and *The Third Man Theme* (The Harry Lime Theme) which we joined in song with gusto.

## KNUTSFORD ACCORDION DAY 2025

Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> May heralded the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Accordion Workshop Day, hosted by the North Staffs Accordion Club. The venue was the pleasantly situated Marthall Village Hall near Knutsford. The early morning sunshine was glorious as club members began to arrive to prepare for a 10am start.

Chairs were set out, (with a seating plan), pre-owned music displayed for sale, raffle prizes arranged and tea, coffee and biscuits prepared for the arrival of those participating in the day. There was an excited buzz in the room as people gathered and were re-acquainted with one another.

The workshop was led by our MD for the day, Jane Ward, who is MD of the No.1 Ladies Accordion Orchestra.

The  $1^{st}$  session began promptly at 10am with Jane introducing herself and giving us a summary of her impressive musical background. The three pieces we were going to work on had been arranged by Jane and supplied to us prior to the event. We began with a piece called *Beguine for Bert*. It was pointed out to us that this music and the other two that we would tackle during the day, did not contain any directions – i.e, dynamics, phrasing, emphasis etc. and it would be our job to decide what and where these should be. Jane's

plan was to help us develop musicality and encourage us with advice and instruction.

As we worked through the piece she added tips on bellows technique, control exercises and adding body movements to enhance our playing. Some of these we probably had known before, but they had receded into the dark recesses of our minds or they were completely new to us. An hour and a quarter later and feeling the effects of total immersion and concentration, we had developed a bland musical piece into an exciting, dynamic performance.

We took a 20 minute break and were treated to hot beverages and a magnificent array of calorie laden cakes supplied by the lady members of the club.

The 2<sup>nd</sup> session began with a very different arrangement of *Scarborough Fair*. This was tackled in the same manner as before and as lunchtime approached and tummies began to rumble, we performed our final version. By now our photographer Lydia had arrived and began popping in and around us snapping facial expressions and general mug shots.

During the lunch break there were raffle tickets to buy, music to purchase and more cakes to consume. Picnic lunches were taken outside, making the most of the glorious sunny weather. The obligatory group photo was taken by Lydia and then we drifted indoors for the start of the 3<sup>rd</sup> session.

The last piece to be tackled was *Gypsy Train* and proved to be the most demanding. Interestingly, Jane revealed that although she had arranged it, she had never heard it performed. Our efforts could have been

sheer joy or utter disappointment for her – best we don't know. Given the relatively short time that we had to work on this testing piece, we did finally achieve a credible performance.

We took a break a 4.15pm and during refreshments, the raffle took place. Proceeds from the day were being donated to *Cancer Research UK*. At 4.45pm



the workshop orchestra was seated and ready to give a grand performance of the 3 pieces we had worked so hard on. The audience was small but very appreciative.

This was followed by Simon Kensdale from the Chester and Weaver Valley clubs. He entertained us with an amusing poem about playing the accordion, called *Ebuliance*.

A rare treat came next as Ken Farran (MD of the now lapsed Weaver Valley Band) and his wife Wendy played a duet called *Ferientag* by Hokzshuh. Ken recently celebrated his 90<sup>th</sup> birthday and proved to us all that when words fail, music speaks. Wendy then played a duet with herself using her digital Bugari. It was a calming, peaceful rendition of *Last of the Summer Wine and* had the effect of inducing a dreamy effect after a busy day.

Julie Best took centre stage next with 3 pieces played in her usual lively style. They were *Der Draufganger* (The Acrobat), a Latin American piece called *Rumbata* and a Sicilian Tarantella – *Bel Fiore*.

Finally, our MD Jane, played 3 pieces, all without the aid of little black dots. First was *Billy's Breton*, then *Brazil* (Faro). Next were 2 jigs played using a drone effect, called *Just for Fun* and *High part of the Road*.

There was huge appreciation for every one's efforts and Steve Hughes brought the event to a close at 6 pm with thanks to all concerned with making the day another success. We gathered our belongings, distributed left over cake, said our goodbyes and headed for home.

#### THIRD PLACE AT THE NORTHERN IRELAND ACCORDION CHAMPIONSHIPS by Ian Harris

From September 2024 to March 2025, I prepared for the Northern Ireland Accordion Championships with the dedicated support of my tutor, Anne-Marie Devine from Northern Ireland. Encouraged by her simple

advice to 'have a go', I entered the Senior Player (over 60) category, selecting five tunes: *The Dark Island* by Iain McLachlan, *The Harvest Home*, *The Rakes of Mallow*, *Out on the Ocean*, and *Grandfather's Clock* (for the solo).

Some pieces were more challenging than others—*The Harvest Home* required a slow and steady approach, while *Out on the Ocean* presented rhythmic difficulties due to its 6/8 time signature. Nevertheless, I practised daily, often in the evenings while my wife and son watched Emmerdale and Coronation Street, in the bedroom.

Our journey began on Thursday, 6th March, with an overnight stay in Ayr, followed by the 11:30 ferry from Cairnryan on Friday. We arrived in Belfast by mid-afternoon, just in time to change and attend the Friday evening event at the Hilton—a brilliant start to the championships, showcasing both standard and electric accordions.

My first competition performance on Saturday morning didn't go as planned—it was my very first time playing solo in competition—but my second session at 3:10pm went much better. I was praised for the performance, with just one suggestion: give the bellows a bigger squeeze to produce more sound.

We returned in the evening for the awards ceremony. I had no expectations, given it was my first competition and at such a prestigious level. To my delight, I earned two third-place trophies in the afternoon sessions—now proudly displayed in our sitting room.

The weekend was a fantastic experience, brilliantly organised by Clyde Johnstone. I'm grateful to Tony Britton from the North Staffs Accordion Club for his invaluable advice and to fellow members at the Beginners and Improvers evenings in Bradwell for their encouragement.

Ian tries to get to the Beginners/Improvers session of our club once a month. Not a mean feat in that it involves a 233 mile drive, 5 hours each way, and an overnight stay, all the way from Lowestoft, Suffolk. What a hero.
