

North Staffs Accordion Club 17th June club night featured a guest performance by Steve Roxton, Jean Dauvin, and Thérèse Dauvin at Bradwell Workingmen's Club, as part of their 2025 tour of the British accordion clubs. They arrived early to set up their electronic equipment

After the usual introductory group playalong by the club players, Steve Roxton took to the stage. Steve currently lives in Middlesborough having previously lived in Jersey where he formed the Jersey Accordion Band. He gave us a rendition of *En Evante*, *Irish Medley*, *Luci e Ombre*, Elvis and Russian medleys, Jealousy, Sorrento, and a rock and roll medley. He has good stage presence, giving us the vocals, sometimes in German or French.



Jean Dauvin took over with his 4-row button Museteck accordion, and gave a demonstration of the different 'voices' of his instrument, playing an appropriate piece to suit each voice. He then played French medleys including C'est Magnifique and C'est Si Bon, and O Sole Mio, Blue Danube, El Condor Pasa, Mexican Hat Dance, Rag Time medley, Jesu Joy of Man's Desiring, and Honey Honey. His wife, Therese, joined him in song in some of these, and she has a lovely vocal style which fits perfectly with Jean's virtuoso playing.

Jean and Therese live in Avranches, France. Jean has had a remarkable career spanning championships, band leadership,

teaching and solo performances, and was also deputy mayor of his home town 1995 and 2014.

After the break we had performances by two of our members before our guests returned to the stage. Charlie Walker sang Beatles songs I Will and Honey Pie with guitar accompaniment, and John Jones played a French medley.

Jean Dauvin, with vocals again by Therese, started the second half with La Vie en Rose, If You Love Me, Que Sera Sera, Take me to Your Heart Again, Non je ne Regrette Rien, and Roll out the Barrel before Steve Roxton joined him finishing the evening with Bluebell Polka, Blaze Away, La Vie en Rose, The Dambusters March, I Love You Because medley, Music Man, a Scottish medley, and also a UK medley.



JOY RENDELL - MY POTTED ACCORDION LIFE STORY



I was about 13 years of age when I started to learn to play the piano accordion, following in the footsteps of my eldest brother, 14 years my senior. What with mom

and dad loving songs from the shows and the likes of Richard Tauber and my brother into skiffle and Lonny Donegan, understandably music enriched my life from a young age.

Alan Jones taught me in those early days and ironically, the small girl taking her lesson after mine was called Anne. She went on to become Anne Towe after marrying Stewart from the Black Country Accordion Club!

Both Anne and I were members of the 'Les Devaldi Junior Accordion Band' led by Les Devaldi (Les Knock). Our highlight of playing was at the Bilston Flower Show. Les encouraged my singing and I was soon affectionately known for singing Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious! and A Spoonful of Sugar! Also, in that band was Barry Smith!

The band played all over the Black Country at various interesting events such as, pigeon suppers, social clubs, and as my singing career grew I even sang at the Black




Country Night Out, where I was privileged to share the stage with the local famous talented Dolly Allen and Tommy Mundan. I didn't realise then how famous they would become, even featuring on the TV.

Who'd have thought!

After reading an advert in the Birmingham Post 1976, 'Accordionists! Come and join us at the Stag and Three Horseshoes', I went along to see what it was all about and became a founder member of the Birmingham accordion club 'Club Accord', set up by our very own Malcolm Gee. It can be said with hand on heart that without Malcom Gee's enthusiasm, love of the accordion, and the tireless energy to get people together none of the social accordion activities and events would have happened. No Birmingham Club Accord, no Caister, no St Audrie's Bay and no Accordion Family as it's grown to become.

Who'd have thought!

Malcolm was a great one to rope people in! One year I helped with the running of his Spring Camp held in a farmer's field not far from his pub. Accordion playing campervanners turned up for the week playing morning, noon and night. Thankfully I'd taken simple band parts and in no time we had a little band going. On rainy days we would play in Malcolm's pub and on one of these occasions we had surprise visitors. Apparently, Arley Steam Railway Station, just a walk away from the pub, was filming the TV series 'Oh, Doctor Beeching' and the cast, including Sue Pollard (Hi-de-Hi), turned up at the pub for a warm and something to eat. Malcolm's chef worked only evenings, so

yours truly cooked fish and chips for the entire cast! I was gratefully thanked, for that lunch had gone down very well! I'll admit I felt one of those gratifying moments one has in life!



Caister, as he sadly passed away the following year.

Malcolm then asked me to take charge of the line dancing he was intending to introduce at the Caister festival later that year. I set about attending a line dancing club and learned steps very quickly as well as the art of 'calling'. Some may still remember me more for the line dancing than playing the accordion!!

That same year at Caister I was awarded the 'Club Accord Shield' for services to the accordion movement. This was to be Malcolm's final year at

Because of Club Accord I met Ingrid Gould, nee Prince, Tracy Middleton and many more special people I proudly call friends. We go back a long way. Because of Club Accord I entered NAO festivals playing solos, duets and trios. We formed a Club Accord trio and took 3rd place. Our first competition was held at Morecambe 1977, Saturday 14th May to be precise, Jubilee Year. Yes, I still have the programme featuring famous names, Nigel Pasby, Karen Street, Julie Best, Andrew Purkiss and none other than our very own HARRY. I was Joy Waterhouse in those days duetting with Ingrid. We came 4th in the Advanced Duet section. We went on the following year to enter the Burton-on-Trent Festival, Advanced Solo Section, Ingrid taking first and me second.

Who'd have thought!!

We were on a roll and decided to organise the Birmingham Accordion Festival held at Bournville Cadbury Hall. It was an all-day competing event, followed by a full evening's entertainment of the category winners, as well as a special performance by the Francis Wright Orchestra and led by our very own Rosemary Wright.

Who'd have thought!!

A new chapter in my life, family and work commitments brought great changes taking us to Leek, North Staffs, but I always made time for my accordion and singing. Here I became a founder member of the North Staffs Accordion Club along with the late Brian Shufflebotham and the wonderful late George Karklins. We

also formed a band. George wrote parts the old fashioned way with pen and paper, no computer in those days! We learned from each other. New, good and bad techniques but hey-ho! It was a great experience, great friends, fond memories and such fun.

You can imagine how delighted I am that the club is still going strong today and how proud that I am part of that story.

A further work related move took us to Sheffield, where, yes you've guessed, I started the Sheffield Accordion Club! I was missing the music in my life and it seemed a natural decision to start a club. I'd done it before! So, I placed an advert in the local paper to which I received a phone call from a chap saying he'd seen the ad but did I mind him joining in as he played guitar — for those who remember, he was the late Phil Jubb. I was delighted, at least someone was going to turn up I thought!! I was a little apprehensive, nervous even, about the first night starting a new club. Why did I worry!! Phil knew Harry H. Harry turned up to surprise me, as did a number of players and non-players and we had the most wonderful evening to remember. The club has also grown from strength to strength and is still a great success today.

Who'd have thought!!

Devon is where I now live. Not having the same success to get a club off the ground here in Paignton was disappointing, but none the less, I did meet Yvonne, who remains a true friend. We're proud to say that back in about 1996, having formed a ladies' accordion quartet, we were instrumental in raising enough funds, through putting on musical concerts. These funds covered the transportation costs for a desperately needed radiation gamma camera, donated by Torbay Hospital, where Yvonne worked as superintendent radiographer. The camera was urgently needed in Belarus following the Chernobyl nuclear disaster. This was the start of a programme, led by Brixham's Inner Wheel Club, to raise funding for flights and accommodation for 12 children aged between 7 and 12 years to come to Torbay for a 6 weeks summer holiday, just to take in the fresh air. And this programme is still going on today.

Who'd have thought!!

With my family grown up now and 5 grandchildren, I still make time for my accordion and singing. I play regularly for two Dementia Cafés and afternoon singsong sessions, and I also sing in a swing band.

Throughout my musical life I have instigated or helped to raise countless funds for charity events and this I still continue to do today.

9,000 years later - I can be found at Barry's West Midlands Accordion Festival - The Eastbourne Festival (Collette and Gennaro) and St. Audries Bay with Caroline Hussey, Sammie and Lisa-Lee, just so I can meet up with the Accordion Family to reminisce and natter.

Thank you Malcolm Gee but also a big thank you to Mike, my husband; he's such a star, by my side as always and my number one fan!

Finally, I'd like to thank Steve Hughes for inviting me to the North Staffs Special Big Birthday Celebrations in May which I'll be delighted to attend. 40 years!!

Scottish accordionist **Ryan Corbett**, performed with the Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra at Sunday 20th July's BBC Proms at the Royal Albert Hall. He featured in Shostakovich's *Suite for Variety Orchestra* (also featured in the same programme was Nicholas McCarthy's performance of Ravel's *Piano Concerto for the Left Hand*).

From the age of 14, Ryan studied under Djordje Gajic who was one of the adjudicators in the first national composer's competition held by North Staffs Accordion Club at Hanley Museum in 2000 (when Ryan was 1 year old!).

We got the sad news of the death on the 17th June 2025, of Pauline Barker, at the ripe old age of 94. She was previously a member of our club and band (3rd accordion). She lived, with partner, Ernie Brooks, in the house in which she was born in Hanley and in which she had lived all her life. Ernie, who is just a few months older than her, was also a member of our band. They left when their eyesight deteriorated and driving became a problem.

Ernie and Pauline formed a dance band and played for various clubs and dance events in the Hanley area and beyond, in particular the Polish club, and they were well known in the area.

Geoff Capewell and I represented the club at Pauline's funeral and were surprised to find out that she had twice driven a van from Hanley to Poland to deliver clothing to a charity there; something she never talked about in the club. She was a remarkable woman and a stalwart of her church where the funeral took place. It was only about 20 yards or so from her house.

It is a sad loss and our thoughts go out to Ernie and her family. RIP.



ACCORDION WORKSHOP WITH RYAN CORBETT



On Saturday 26th July 2025, I attended an accordion workshop which was to launch the 2025 Arts Festival in Church Stretton. The workshop was arranged with the well-known local accordion teacher, Ed Mosley and led by BBC New Generation Artist and Classic FM Rising Star, Ryan Corbett. He is a leading exponent of the accordion and has enlarged the repertoire for this instrument by creating hundreds of new arrangements. He won the honour of performing at the Scottish coronation of

HM King Charles III. He made his debut at

London's Wigmore Hall last year.

Ryan was born in Glasgow in 1999 and studied at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. He plays a Bugari Spectrum classical piano accordion. In the evening of the workshop afternoon, he was giving a concert across the road in St Laurence Church.

On arrival in Church Stretton, I had to park in a local car park and transport my instrument about 400 metres to the venue where I was warmly welcomed by Ed Mosley, a friendly, bubbly guy, excited to meet us. Shortly after I walked in, I was followed by another of our club members, Joe Hill and his wife Mary.

The workshop was designed for those at intermediate level (Grade 4 and above).

There were seven participants which made the afternoon very personal. We were able to ask questions easily and it felt like a private lesson.

The welcome was made by Ed, and Ryan began by asking us to introduce ourselves and say a few words about our musical background. It's always interesting to hear the stories of others. Then we began work on the first of three pieces to be studied, *Postlude*. We played the piece together and then Ryan played it for us. The stunned silence said it all. 'It didn't sound like that when I played it". He then started to explain about phrasing and flow, suspension, bellows, cadence, interpretation, simple structure and posture. (Some were leaning back with the instrument sloping towards the knees.) This unbalances the accordion and makes it harder to work the bellows as they are fighting against gravity. So advice was to sit up straight and slightly

forward. We were able to chat easily with Ryan and he offered all kinds of tips and advice, to any who asked.

A short tea and biscuits break followed. We took photos and exchanged information with each other.

The 2nd piece chosen was *L'Arc en Ciel* (*The Rainbow*). Same format as before, we played together and then Ryan demonstrated. Hmmm! Why did I feel so inadequate? This young man is exceptional. So, words such as, sostenuto bass, sustained legato, consistent bellows, rubato, cassotto, all in my head somewhere, were used.

The final piece, *Playa Las Canteras*, was played by Ryan and again he stunned us. But as he explained about melody singing out over a held note, and sorted out fingering on a bass run it all made sense. As I sat

there I had a bizarre thought. I have been learning to play the accordion longer than Ryan had been alive. I am old enough to be his granny and here was this terrific young 26yr old teaching me. It was an absolute privilege to be there.

Before the workshop ended, Ed Mosley requested that Ryan played something from the evening concert for us. He chose *Loch Katrine's Lady*. It was impressive and



received well deserved applause from our small group. Andrew Hall (Chair of the Arts Committee) closed the event and thanked us all for attending.

I left Joe and Mary Hill preparing to attend the evening concert and felt very jealous. But I had a long journey home ahead of me so I said my goodbyes and headed back to the car. What a great day!
